Shannon Brownlee is a nationally known writer and essayist whose book, *Overtreated: Why Too Much Medicine is Making Us Sicker and Poorer* was named the best economics book of 2007 by *New York Times* economics correspondent, David Leonhardt, and is being used by legislators and policymakers to craft health care reform legislation. A former senior editor at *U.S. News & World Report*, her work has appeared in a wide variety of publications including the *Atlantic Monthly*, *Discover*, *Glamour*, *More*, *Mother Jones*, *New York Times Magazine*, *The New Republic*, *Slate*, *Time*, *Washington Monthly*, *Washington Post*, *Los Angeles Times*, and the *British Medical Journal*.

In 2008-2009, Ms. Brownlee served as a visiting scholar at the National Institutes of Health, and is a Woodrow Wilson Visiting Scholar. She is a recipient of the Association of Health Care Journalists Award for Excellence, the Victor Cohn Prize for Excellence in Medical Science Reporting, the National Association of Science Writers Science-in-Society Award, and the Sigma Delta Chi Award from the Society of Professional Journalists. She holds a Master of Science in marine sciences from the University of California, Santa Cruz.

As a Senior Research Fellow in the Economic Growth Program at the New America Foundation, Ms. Brownlee writes and speaks about health care economics, the pharmaceutical industry, and medical innovation.
